

### RULES OF THE AIR

There has been questions and discussion on the Forum and among Club members about the rules for kite flying. These are contained in the Air Navigation Order 2000 which is about 400 pages long. It should be noted that many rules quoted in publications or books are out of date. If you require up to date detailed information you need to study the ANO 2000 and its amendments by visiting the CAA website.

The following are the relevant extracts from The Air Navigation Order 2000 and a Kite is classed as an Aircraft. (Schedule 2 Part A)

Endangering safety of any person or property 64 A person shall not recklessly or negligently cause or permit an aircraft to endanger any person or property.

Balloons, kites, airships, gliders and parascending parachutes 86 (1) The provisions of this article shall apply only to or in relation to aircraft within the United Kingdom.

86 (1) (b) (iv) a kite shall not be flown at a height of more than thirty metres above ground level within the aerodrome traffic zone of a notified aerodrome during the notified operating hours of that aerodrome;

Note: A rough rule of thumb is a 5 Km radius from the runway centre, the actual rules are rather longwinded. If a several kites are to be flown, courtesy requires you to inform the Air Traffic Control for the airfield.

86 (1) (b) (v) a kite shall not be flown at a height of more than sixty metres above ground level

Note: It is understood that above ground level means just that, the distance perpendicular to the ground. If you are flying on a hill side into a valley it means the height from the valley bottom perpendicular to the kite. However we understand that the CAA will give special permission for flying in this manner if the regular site being used is on a hill side and they will issue appropriate NOTAMS. (Notice to Airmen)

132 The provisions of this Order other than articles
58,64,85(1),86 (height limits),87,118(1)(b),129(1),(2) and (5) shall not apply to or in relation to:
(a) any small balloon;
(b) any kite weighing not more than 2 kg;
(c) any small aircraft; or

(d) any parachute including a parascending parachute.

Note This section has been a cause of confusion. Kites weighing not more than 2 kg are NOT exempt from the height limit. Fighter kite flyers please note ( including me ).

Rules of Air (These apply only if "height clearance" has been granted )

Kites at night flying above 60 metres require lights on the line as specified in the rules and Kites flying above 60 metres during the day require streamers on the line as specified in the rules. Note The CAA have waived some of these Rules of Air in the past.

Written Permission from the CAA is required to fly above 60 metres (or 30 metres near an airfield). and the CAA permission makes several conditions as follows.

The said kites shall not be flown in a visibility of less than 5 kilometres nor within 1000 feet vertically or 1800 metres horizontally of cloud. These match the Visual Flight Rules for powered aircraft.

Note the mixture of metric and imperial units, 1800 metres is about a mile! The conditions do not allow Kites flying into or near cloud but they do this at Festivals, I was in an Altitude sprint at Washington where several kites were in cloud at the end.

Flying over 60 metres with CAA clearance in daylight

I have never seen anyone fly with streamers of the approved kind attached to their kites. Has anyone? The CAA waived this rule for our world duration record attempt.

Flying over 60 metres with CAA clearance at night

Kites are supposed to have lights on them giving 5 candela of light. The problem with this that you cannot buy lights that are certified to give a minimum of 5 candela .

I have not seen for sale any lights that quote a candela figure for illumination.

The closest information I have found is that Department for Transport says that legally flashing bicycle lights must be not less that 4 candela.

Further the ground end of the flying line must be inside a triangle with sides 25 metres long consisting of

three flashing lights fixed to the ground, two red and one green.

Once again these rules were waived for our world duration record attempt. All we had to do was provide a triangle of three red lights where the kites were tethered when flying in the dark.

Perhaps the answer to these problems is to ask for the rules to be waived when we ask for height clearance for an event. (see below)

Exemption from the Air Navigation Order 2000 Article 127 The CAA may exempt from any of the provisions of this order (other than Articles 75, 77, 82, 113, 114, 115, 116 178 thereof) or any Regulations made thereunder any aircraft or persons or classes of aircraft or persons either absolutely or subject to such conditions as it thinks fit.

This is the Article which gives the CAA authority to grant "height clearance" for kites and to impose the restrictions relating to visibility and cloud base.

Rather than accepting the conditions and then ignoring them, Kite Groups should try obtain more realistic conditions relating to clouds and ask for exemptions from the use of streamers and lights. Flying at 600 metres (1800 feet) would only require two streamers at most

Penalties for infringements of Air Navigation Order 2000

A fine or up to five years in prison or both, depending on the article breached.

Overflying by Aircraft

All pilots are required to take a pre flight briefing which includes reading NOTAMS (Notices to Airmen) and therefore should know about temporary height clearance permissions for kite flying.

The main problem has been at Beacon Park . I have noted the incidents, time, date and aircraft type and complained to the CAA about it. I also wrote to the Police about the Paramotor incident a few years ago. The problem is that without registration numbers an official follow up is not possible, I asked them to issue reminders to private pilots about the need to read NOTAMS before flying. Getting aircraft registration numbers of overflying aircraft is extremely difficult as several of our members will tell you.

Aircraft are allowed to overfly the site but with good separation above our height limit. This can lead to problems judging their height against our limit. The quadrantal rules specify 500 feet separation.

At Chester we are in contact with Air Traffic Control all week end and report directly to them about overflights.

Kite flyers are not the only ones with this problem because several air displays have reported overflying and some have even had to cancel programme items because of it. The Red Arrows have had several programmes disrupted because of it.


### ONE SKY ONE WORLD 2006 (PONTEFRACT)


